I shall ask the Father, and he shall give you another Advocate




By now we are some distance away from Easter, but the season is still permeated with the Easter message: Christ is risen, we are baptised in him. But today a new dimension of the story comes out: Easter is not complete until the risen Lord has returned to the Father and sent the Holy Spirit. So in the Gospel today we begin two weeks of looking forward to the coming of that 'Spirit of truth' which sets us apart from the world.


This is a Spirit of power, which flows through the life of the Church, enabling its members to 'proclaim the Christ' and, dwelling in our hearts, to live in the midst of the world's slander and accusations.

21 May 2020. The Ascension of the Lord

All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me



The feast of The Ascension, which we celebrate this coming Thursday, is not just a feast that happens to fall in Eastertide: it is an integral part of the Easter mystery. Remember the Lord's words at the Last Supper: 'I am going to prepare a place for you, and after I have gone and prepared you a place, I shall return to take you with me.' The Resurrection presumes the Lord's return to the Father. This is therefore a feast of hope: hope in the Lord's return; hope that he will take us with him, when our bodies are raised as his was; hope that we will take our place in heaven, where he sits on the Father's right.



I've not been very disciplined about taking any exercise these past few weeks, but this morning I got up early and walked along the river to Countess Wear. It was a glorious morning. Looking back towards Topsham I took this picture of the mist rising above the fields in the early sunshine. The words "Praise be to you, O Lord" sprang to mind. They are the opening words of the Canticle of the Sun composed by St Francis of Assisi and the inspiration for Pope Francis' extraordinary encyclical 'Laudato Si'. This week we are celebrating the fifth anniversary of its publication and reminding ourselves of the beauty of Creation and our place and role in it. Many people have commented that as we experience the global coronavirus pandemic, when a huge proportion of humanity has been in lockdown, creation has found the time and space to reassert herself and to show herself off without the overlay of human greed and degradation; the birdsong seems louder, the skies seem clearer, the air seems fresher. Let's at some point this week get out into Creation and give thanks to God for his wonderful masterpiece.

There has been much talk recently about how we are to emerge from 'lockdown'. Particularly interesting for us as a parish is how we will be able to open the church, in the first instance for private prayer and then at a later date for public worship. Cardinal Nichols is sitting on the Government taskforce developing a plan to reopen places of worship and is putting our case forward with some force. He has stated that Catholics have been 'starved' of the eucharist and wish to receive the Lord again as soon as possible. But we know that our safety, and particularly the safety of the most vulnerable will be paramount. As a diocese, and a parish, we will follow the guidelines and regulations set out for us, but we have begun the conversation about how we could safely provide a space for prayer and a return to some sense of normality. God knows how much we all look forward to that!

When it happens it is likely that we will need volunteers from the parish to help; stewarding, guiding, cleaning etc. Please pray about this and ask the Lord to help you respond willingly and generously.

On Thursday this week we celebrate the ASCENSION OF THE LORD. We commemorate the moment when Jesus was lifted from the earth to take his place in heaven alongside his Father. I'm reminded of the times when I have stood on railway platforms waving goodbye and waiting until I'm absolutely sure I can't see the person I love waving back. I'm sure the apostles weren't standing around waving, but they must have sensed something of the same emotions of loss and grief. Jesus promised them he would return and at PENTECOST we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, filling the apostles with confidence and faith.

Let us pray that the same Holy Spirit will give us renewed confidence and faith, and hope too, that we will be renewed and refreshed by his presence. We place ourselves in his hands. Fr Jonathan.

Stretch Out Your Hands!

The Catholic Children's Society (Plymouth) needs your help now more than ever! In every country and community across the world, the coronavirus pandemic is turning children's lives upside down. We urgently need your help so that we can continue to support vulnerable children and their families throughout the Diocese.
