

As the Father sent me, so am I sending you: receive the Holy Spirit

So we arrive at the fiftieth day – the completion of the Easter Season, and the completion of the Paschal Mystery: the Lord has died, is risen, has ascended to heaven and now gives birth to his Church, by sending the Spirit upon the apostles. This feast of the gift of the Spirit is so significant for us, because it marks the handing on of Jesus's ministry to the Church – in the Church we are guaranteed the presence of the Lord, in his sacraments, in his ministers, in the Blessed Sacrament and in his celebrated Word. It also marks the fulfilment of our thoughts about baptism throughout this season: the gift of the Spirit which we receive in Confirmation is the 'seal' of our baptism, guaranteeing and confirming all that baptism achieves.

Pentecost Novena

In the lead up to the important Christian festival of Pentecost, we're offering nine days of prayer for evangelisation to promote Christian unity and the Gospel message of Jesus. Pentecost falls fifty days after Easter and celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit. Attached to the newsletter is a Novena for you to follow leading up to Pentecost. It is also available on the parish Facebook page. Don't worry about not starting on the first day (there is no time in heaven!), you can simply catch up!

An emerging Church

Today's Feast of Pentecost marks the moment the Church emerged from it's hiding place of the Upper Room and began proclaiming the Good News to the world. There is a certain parallel here for us. We have been in lockdown for these past weeks but are now contemplating the easing of restrictions and how we might once again be able to gather to pray and worship God. How will we emerge from this period of hiding? I'm sure it will be with joy and gladness, but I hope also that it will be with a sense of humility. This time has been one of reflection for us as individuals, as families and as a parish. We have been forced to re-evaluate what really matters. We have lost loved ones and had to change the way we live. Some people think that the Church will never be the same; that those who have been starved of the sacraments for so long will not be able to rekindle their faith and retake their place in the community. Some feel they have been abandoned. I know that we are stronger than that. I hope that this period of starvation has strengthened, not diminished our faith. I know that things will be different, they will have to be, but then, as St John Henry Newman reminds us: 'to change is to grow and to be perfect is to have changed often'. Things will have changed, but God never changes. The Holy Spirit, poured out upon the Church at Pentecost is constant, unchanging, ever-present. It is the Holy Spirit who will lead and guide us through this period of uncertainty. It is the Holy Spirit who will decide, if we'll let him, how we as a parish will be in the future. It is the Holy Spirit, Jesus himself who is the Way, the Truth and the Life. When the disciples began their ministry to the world, proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus, they must have been as astonished as the people they spoke to. Let us be astonished at the power of the Holy Spirit present in us and in our community. Let us be open to his awesome power. Let us not be afraid, but go out as confident messengers of hope. Reopening of Churches

An update on the current position with the Government from Bishop Mark:

You will have noted that the Prime Minister announced earlier this week that Churches were not to be opened for public worship before 4 July. In light of this, the following statement was prepared by the Bishop's Conference:

The timing and manner of the opening of churches touches profound sensitivities and spiritual needs. The Government's document and statements fail to recognise this. The Government's position, established today, includes these steps aimed at opening churches as soon as possible: the establishment of a task force for places of worship, to work closely with 'stakeholders' in ensuring that premises are COVID-19 secure; and heeding the experience of other countries in which churches are already open for worship. In dialogue with the Government, the Catholic Church will continue its engagement in this process and has already submitted a detailed plan, in full accordance with public health guidelines, for churches to be opened for private prayer.

The Church is ready to play its full part in the task force, understanding that this includes the possible earlier use of churches for private prayer, as a first safe step towards their use for public worship. Cardinal Nichols has agreed to join the task force for Places of Worship, which the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government are creating. He has already had some conversations with the Secretary of State Robert Jenrick, covering the issues around the opening of our churches. Many Bishops, myself included, are advocating, with him, for an earlier opening, at least for personal prayer, and as an interim step, before July.

So the bishops have asked parishes to begin considering how this might happen for us. It is hoped that some parishioners will volunteer to be stewards on a rota that would see the church open for private prayer for a limited period each day. It is anticipated that the stewards would supervise people entering and leaving the church, observe social distancing is maintained and that all relevant surfaces and door handles are regularly cleaned. Feast of St Boniface

On Friday 5 June we celebrate the feast St Boniface – patron of our diocese. For the first forty years of his life Boniface was known as Wynfrith. He was born in Devon and educated at the monastery at Exeter, and then joined the Benedictine abbey at Nursling, near Southampton. He was a teacher and preacher, but he desired to preach the gospel in a foreign land. In 718, Pope Gregory II commissioned him to do so, at the same time changing his name from Wynfrith to Boniface. Boniface left England, never to return, and took the gospel to the heathen tribes of Germany, where he had great success. He himself was created Bishop of Mainz, and he founded or restored dioceses in Bavaria, Thuringia, and Franconia. In his later years he worked with King Pepin the Short to reform the Frankish church, and then, over seventy years old, set out to evangelize Friesland (part of modern Holland) where he was set upon and murdered, on 5 June 754. He is buried at Fulda, near Frankfurt, in the monastery he founded himself, and is honoured as the apostle of Germany. Universalis

Making an Act of Spiritual Communion

ST THOMAS AQUINAS defined Spiritual Communion as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him."

The basis of this practice was explained by Pope John Paul II in his encyclical, *Ecclesia de Eucharistia*: In the Eucharist, "unlike any other sacrament, the mystery *[of communion]* is so perfect that it brings us to the heights of every good thing: Here is the ultimate goal of every human desire, because here we attain God and God joins himself to us in the most perfect union." Precisely for this reason it is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the sacrament of the Eucharist. This was the origin of the practice of "spiritual communion," which has happily been established in the Church for centuries and recommended by saints who were masters of the spiritual life. St. Teresa of Jesus wrote: "When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you".

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to receive you into my soul. See Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. See I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

I love this image of Pentecost. It seems to so beautifully capture our parish, made up of people from around the world, as we reach up to receive the Holy Spirit. The wounded hands of Jesus, reaching down from his place in heaven, release the Spirit. It's holy fire blazes above each of us and fills us with joy. Try to contemplate this picture this coming week. Place yourself in the frame. With your mind and your heart (and perhaps even your hands) reach out to God and ask him to pour out the Holy Spirit upon you, upon those you love and upon our parish family. You could use this lovely prayer from the Pentecost Novena to help you:

Prayer for the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Lord Jesus, before ascending to your Father you promised to send the Holy Spirit to your disciples. We ask you now to send your Holy Spirit upon our Parish and give us: The Spirit of **Wisdom** that we may discern the way forward; The Spirit of **Piety** that we may love you with true devotion; The Spirit of **Courage** that we may witness to you come what may; The Spirit of **Knowledge** that we may know you in friendship and love; The Spirit of **Understanding** that our minds will be enlightened by truth; The Spirit of **Coursel** that we may choose the right path to follow; The Spirit of **Awe and Wonder** that we may be filled with loving reverence for you.

Spirit of the Living God, grant us your gifts today so that we may work together to make our parish ever more missionary and a true reflection of your presence in the world.

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in us the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and we shall be created and you shall renew the face of the earth.

O God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit, did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant us in the same Spirit to be truly wise and ever to rejoice in his consolation. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
