God sent

We begin our Summer 'Ordinary Time' by celebrating a strange feast - not of a particular saint or event, but of the awesome paradoxes of our God, the Three-in-One, Father, Son and Spirit: so immeasurably distant, yet so amazingly close, so full of power and so full of love. It is love that is the key to the mystery: the revelation of God, to Moses and in

Jesus Christ, the Son of God, shows a perfect love - a perfect unity. In the beginning, in the story of Creation in Genesis, God made man and woman 'in the image and likeness of God', to live together as a community of love. So too, the Church is an image of this perfection of community which is Father, Son and Spirit. We, as many members of one Church, strive in our everyday lives to imitate God who is Three and One, perfect unity and perfect love.

This beautiful and very well known icon by the Russian artist Andrei Rublev is entitled The Hospitality of Abraham and depicts the moment Abraham entertained the three strangers at the Oak of Mamre (you can see the tree in the background). Rublev depicts the three as angels. Painted in around 1410, it has become one of the most significant depictions of the Trinity and has led to much reflection and devotion. It is said that the space at the front side of the table is reserved for us and that all we have to do to share the life of the Trinity is to accept the invitation.

Opening our church

You will no doubt have heard that Robert Jenrick, the Secretary of State for Housing and Communities has announced that our churches may open for private prayer, as long as safety measures are in place, from Monday 15th June. It would have seemed unlikely that a ruling which allowed people to browse in shops would have prevented those same people from visiting a church, where it is likely that social-distancing will be much more feasible. In the parish we have been considering what this will mean for us for some time now. We are making sure that when we open, and that might not necessarily be immediately, we will be able to do so without compromising anyone's safety and making sure it is a positive and spiritually rewarding experience.

What we will need are people to help. It is likely that we would open for a few hours a day, perhaps a couple in the morning and a couple in the evening. We will need at least three volunteers to be present for each session, to greet and assist those coming and to help clean and sanitise the pews, door handles etc. after each visitor. So please do let us know if you are willing to help. This is an opportunity for lots of people to be involved. The more volunteers we get, the more often we will be able to be open. Let us know by emailing the parish exeter-heavitree@prcdtr.org.uk Thank you to the people who have already offered. When we know how many are prepared to help we will draw up a rota and plan to offer some guidance about how to assist. Obviously those people who are in a vulnerable group, e.g. those who are over 70 or have underlying health conditions would be advised not to volunteer in the first instance, but certainly welcome to take advantage of the opportunity to visit the church.

The possibility of us being able to return to celebrating Mass and gathering to pray collectively is still some way off. When and how that happens needs to be something we continue to pray about. This has been a challenging time for all of us, but I am so heartened by the ways you have adapted; celebrating Mass online, praying together as families; supporting one another in the community. It has been a time of contemplation for us all. I know we will be heartened by this development and the opportunity it gives us as a parish. *Fr Jonathan*

A great blessing

Cardinal Vincent Nichols, President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, has welcomed the decision that Catholic churches, that can safely do so, will re-open for individual prayer on 15 June. The Cardinal hopes people will benefit from the 'sacredness' of our church spaces and describes it as a "great blessing for individuals and for the benefit of all in society, that church doors will again be open to all who long to pray there for the peace and grace we need today."

Cardinal's Full Statement

I am grateful to the Prime Minister for his decision that our churches may now open again for individual prayer. I thank the Secretary of State for Communities, Mr Robert Jenrick and the Minister of State, Lord Stephen Greenhalgh, for their leadership of the Task Force which helped bring about this important step. This is a first, measured step in restoring the more normal practice of our faith and will be welcomed by so many, who have waited with great patience since 23 March when our churches were closed, by Government decision, as part of the fight against this pandemic. I thank everyone for that patience. It is important that every care is taken to ensure that the guidance given for this limited opening is fully observed, not least by those entering our churches. Our preparation is taking place with thoroughness. Visiting a church for individual prayer, benefitting from the sacredness of that space, can be done safely and confidently.

Not every Catholic Church will be open on 15 June. Local decisions and provision have to lead this process. But it is a great blessing, for individuals and for the benefit of all in society, that church doors will again be open to all who long to pray there for the peace and grace we need today. This first step enables us to learn and prepare for those that will take us to a fuller use of our churches, for the celebration of Mass and other sacraments. We await that time with deep longing but patient understanding that the protection of the health of our society, especially of the most vulnerable, is a proper cause for caution and care.

Reflections from a St Nicholas School Classroom

Maria Quinn, our Parish Pastoral Assistant has been back at St Nicholas School this week helping out with a Year 6 'bubble'. She reflects on the experience here:

It's been a strange week: children lining up for the start of the day in the playground on yellow spots painted a perfect socially distanced 2 metres away; parents trying to remember to adhere to a newly introduced one way system in and out of the school grounds; fastidious hand washing, table wiping, sanitising; sparsely populated classrooms but a majority of children attending who can; living in classroom bubbles; playtimes with no equipment; an absence of gingham summer dresses (most children have outgrown them with parents not being able to source them)...

But it's been a good week too: children quickly adjusting to and respecting new rules; using their imaginations to create socially distanced games that can be played outside; classrooms alive again with children laughing, chatting, learning; work going up on classroom walls, a prayer here, a picture there; feeling a part of the school family again...

The staff have been awesome: working tirelessly to produce a 19 page risk assessment; transforming the school hall into two inspiring reception class bubbles; proactively safeguarding children and families both in and out of school and round the clock; creatively sourcing projects that engage and motivate pupils (nothing new there!); nurturing the mental, emotional, and physical well-being of their 'bubble' with good humour and wisdom... not forgetting that staff have worked tirelessly, and without holidays, to look after key worker children and to assess, develop and polish systems/curriculums/ planning ready for the new academic year in September.

Staff will be exhausted this weekend; children will be pleased they don't have to be up and dressed at 8:00am ready to go; parents will appreciate not having to make packed lunches... in so many ways everything has changed, in some small ways nothing has.

Let's pray that week two runs as smoothly as week one and that all remain safe and well; let's pray that the Government make wise and sensible decisions regarding the future opening of our schools and the implications this will have for all involved.

Guidelines for Catholics on Organ Donation

Following a change in the law on 20 May an opt-out system for organ donation was introduced in England. The Catholic Church has consistently encouraged its followers to consider organ donation. The act of donating organs before or after death has been considered a gift and an intrinsic good. However, a system of presumed consent risks taking away the right of the individual to exercise this decision, and therefore potentially undermines the concept of donation as a gift. The Catholic Bishops' of England and Wales have produced Guidelines for Catholics on Organ Donation, and how to record this decision online via the Organ Donation Register (ODR). The ODR also allows you to record your faith beliefs so that they may be respected in the event of death and organ donation. Stretch Out Your Hands!

A huge thank you for helping with the Devon County Show attempt at the Guinness Book of Records Longest Line of Knitted Bunting. Every cloud has a silver lining, and the fact that there was no Devon County Show this year meant that Westpoint (normally the cattle shed!) was empty and we could lay out all the bunting in the building and have it measured. WOW – how tremendous, we had 14,279 meters of bunting made up of 79,001 pieces of bunting. You are all brilliant – I have received packages from over 1025 people or groups, and from all corners of the world – Australia, America, France, Spain, and every corner of this country.

What next: We have to submit all our documentation to Guinness for them to check it and verify it, and then as long as they are happy with it all, they will send us a certificate which of course will be shared with all our contributors. Westpoint is empty and as soon as lockdown is lifted a bit more, I am hoping/expecting to hold open days/evenings so that people can come and see the tremendous amount of work and the beauty of the bunting. I hope you saw it on Spotlight. In due course, some will be returned to the contributor where asked for, some is destined for the RD&E, we have been asked for some by Exmouth Town Council, some will be sold in aid of the Addington Fund (the show charity of the year) some will be kept for Devon County Show 2021, and other ideas are coming in. Ultimately anything left, and the few over size ones received which were not allowed, will be sewed into blankets for the homeless in Devon. The very extra special ones will be kept in perpetuity. So every bit of it will live on

The Feast of Corpus Christi



On Sunday 14 June we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This is the patronal feast of our parish. This year there will be no procession, devotions or benediction. Whilst this is a great sadness for us we are not to lose heart. The Blessed Sacrament is still present in the church.

The sanctuary lamp has stayed alight throughout these days of lockdown reminding us that Jesus never leaves his Church, but is constantly with us.

Making an Act of Spiritual Communion

ST THOMAS AQUINAS defined Spiritual Communion as “an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him.”

The basis of this practice was explained by Pope John Paul II in his encyclical, *Ecclesia de Eucharistia*: In the Eucharist, “unlike any other sacrament, the mystery [of communion] is so perfect that it brings us to the heights of every good thing: Here is the ultimate goal of every human desire, because here we attain God and God joins himself to us in the most perfect union.” Precisely for this reason it is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the sacrament of the Eucharist. This was the origin of the practice of “spiritual communion,” which has happily been established in the Church for centuries and recommended by saints who were masters of the spiritual life. St. Teresa of Jesus wrote: “When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you”. The text of the prayer, which can be no more important than on the Feast of Corpus Christi:

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to receive you into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

May they rest in peace...

This has been a very challenging and often very cruel time as the funerals of those who have died take place within strict social-distancing guidelines. This will continue for some time to come. Please pray for the repose of the souls of Ray Casalucci, whose funeral will be celebrated on Tuesday 9 June and for John Egan whose funeral will be celebrated on 11 June, both at Exeter and Devon Crematorium. May they rest in peace. We pray especially too for the repose of the soul of David Curtis who has died, that he may find peace and rest for his soul. May his family and the families of all who have died at this particularly difficult time find strength and consolation in our prayers and the presence of the Lord.

It's tiring, isn't it? Just waiting. Hoping. Wondering. Feeling cooped up. Missing our dearests.

Or feeling vulnerable. Anxious. Afraid. For ourselves. For those we love.

Or working. Travelling on those strangely silent routes to work. Dancing the 2 metre do-si-do with strangers on footpaths and corridors.

It's hard to be vigilant for so long. Our amazing bodies pumping out the alarm-setting chemicals of flight, freeze or fight. Lifesaving when the danger is a saber-toothed tiger or a rock fall outside our cave. Not so useful when it's a virus...

So if you're too wired to sleep well. Or if you're off your food. Or encountering the munchies. Or that dry mouth. That sinking in the tummy. That palpitating chest. Distractable. Can't settle. Short fuse. Jump at sudden noises. That's all OK.

Take a moment now to thank your amazing body, and your subconscious survival drive, for their astonishing work. All those startling symptoms are their hard work. Admire them. They are symptoms of a highly-functioning personal protection system. Just for a few minutes, take time to appreciate how wonderfully your body is working.

Thank your protection system. And then ask it to just calm down. The constant surveillance is what is tiring us all. Let's let our guard down at home. Let's relax into living more quietly. Let's do what we can to maintain our own and other's safety: keep up the regular hand-washing, maintain the safe-distancing. And then relax a little.

You are amazing. And that's why you're tired. Pat yourself on the back. We're all in this together. You are not alone.
