

Blessed Sacrament Parish Heavitree Exeter **1 November 2020** The Solemnity of All Saints. Year A



"A huge number, impossible to count" – that is the picture this Solemnity creates. In every age there have been men and women who have followed the Lord faithfully, and who now rejoice in the Liturgy of Heaven, as they stand before the throne of the Lamb. These are the "anonymous" saints, whose names we don't remember – but even though their names are not on our lips, their memory, inspiration, example and prayers are set before us today, so that we too can be encouraged in our own "journey of perfection". What does it take to be a saint? Surely the Gospel that is appointed for today (the Beatitudes) shows us that it is in the small things that we triumph: gentleness, mercy, making peace, faithful mourning, purity of heart, poverty in spirit – these are not grand, public ways to sanctity. They are domestic, and homely, to be practised and perfected with those closest to us. We sometimes exalt the "named" saints to the degree that we can feel they are distant from us. Today's feast, as well as celebrating the memory of the many whose name we do not know, also prompts us to see holiness as within our grasp.



Coming to Church

As the Sunday obligation is suspended, you are able to come to any of the Masses celebrated during the week. If you are able to come to a weekday Mass (especially if you are not working) it would help as the Sunday Masses are filling up and we have had to turn some people away. Doors will open 20 minutes before Mass starts. Please arrive in good time and wait outside the porch door. You will be invited into the porch individually or as a household to sanitise your hands, give your contact details for "track and trace" purposes and then wait to be seated by a steward. Please cooperate politely with them as they take you to your seats in church. It may not always be possible for you to sit in your favourite place, but this is so that we can easily accommodate people towards the back of the church minimising disruption during Mass. Once Mass has started the doors will be closed, so please ensure that you arrive in plenty of time. Please place your offering in the basket by the door as you leave.

In line with Government guidelines parishioners should keep to a social distance of 1m+, and must wear a face covering during their time in church (except young and primary school aged children). Please provide your own face covering.

You may find it chilly in church as we have to have as much ventilation as possible to keep you safe - so please bear with us and find those winter jumpers and coats so that you can keep yourself warm in church. Thank you for your understanding.

Stewarding at Mass

Our stewards continue to offer their time to help us celebrate Mass safely and have been doing so for many months now. We would like to be able to give our stewards a break so please volunteer to go on the rota. If you are coming to Mass regularly and are under 70 years old you could take your turn to minister to the community in this way. See it as 'taking your turn' rather than leaving it to a small group of people volunteering.

If you would like to join the team please contact the Parish Office and we will get you on the rota. You may need to undergo some simple training. Please can we ask that all stewards arrive **at least half an hour before the beginning of Mass so** that we can open the doors of the church in readiness for our congregation. Many thanks. NHS COVID-19 App and QR Code for Blessed Sacrament

The NHS has introduced an app for smart phones which enables you to check into venues which display a QR code. We have received a QR Code poster for the Blessed Sacrament Church and this is now on display in the porch. To check in, open your NHS COVID-19 app and tap "Venue Check in". This will open your camera automatically. Scan the QR code on the poster. The time and date of your visit will be stored on the app. It will not be sent or shared with anyone else. As not everyone has a smart phone or is able to use the app, we will also continue to manually take names and contact details. Prison Advice & Care Trust Operation Elf 2020

Every year more than 200,000 children experience the distress and heartache of losing someone they love because of imprisonment. Through no fault of their own, these children will often deal with shame, embarrassment, stigma and loneliness - and may live in households with parents or carers who themselves are struggling to cope. This has been an extremely difficult year for many, and prisoners' children and families have faced many months without any visits and little contact with their loved one in prison. In any given year, Christmas can be a particularly painful time for children with a parent in prison, but never more than this year. It will come as no surprise that we cannot run Operation Elf 2020 in the same way as we have done before, but that doesn't mean we're not doing anything to support the children of prisoners this Christmas. Instead of the toys we would usually ask for, this year we're asking you to buy a book token to the value of £10 that can be sent in a Christmas card to a prisoner's child. Last year, thanks to your generosity, PACT collected 3,000 toys and books - donated by churches, businesses and individuals - which were gifted to prisoners' children by their parents, at special Family Days run by PACT in the run-up to Christmas. This year, with your support, we want to help even more children feel loved and remembered with their own special Christmas gift. With your help, PACT is working to ensure that these children still get to experience the magic of Christmas. Operation Elf gives you the chance to show a little love and care for children

How can you help? Our idea is simple: we are asking you to buy a book token to the value of £10 and post it to our very own Santa's Grotto (OK, it's our Central Office, but shhh!). Our hardworking team of Christmas Elves will then arrange for the book token to be sent to a child in a Christmas card from their mother or father in prison. The child can then take the token to the shop and choose a book that they would like. With your help we can spread a little Christmas cheer to families and children who are separated at Christmas.

That sounds great! Where can I buy a book token? You can buy book tokens online from www.nationalbooktokens.com (using a credit/debit card or PayPal) or from all local bookshops. If you buy your book token online, you can even choose for it to be delivered straight to our Santa's Grotto!

Growing In Faith Together

WHAT IS IT? GIFT is for families of faith; for families with children who are looking forward to receiving Holy Communion; for families with older children who want to be confirmed in their faith; for families with younger children who want to experience and grow in faith in a simple and enjoyable way.

HOW DOES IT WORK? Our first three GIFT sessions at the beginning of this year were a great success with over 30 families joining together at St Nicholas School on Saturday mornings. Due to the current situation and our inability to meet together we are having to do things in a different way. We have invested in resources which are designed to support parents in sharing their faith and helping their families grow in knowledge and love of God, his creation, Jesus his Son and the wonderful gift of the Holy Spirit and his action in the world and our lives. We are offering these resources to any family who may be genuinely interested in and willing to engage in the process. This is not homework for children (!) but a real opportunity for families to share and enjoy their faith at home TOGETHER (which the Church has always described as the Domestic Church).

MONTHLY MEETING Each month we will meet parents for 30 minutes on ZOOM. We will familiarise you with the 'God calls' resources by focusing on: introducing you to the structure and format of the resources; exploring the catechesis and faith teaching of the resource and answering any questions you may have. The material concentrates on coaching you to teach and support your children in learning about faith. Following the Zoom call, you will be emailed the resources which can be used with the whole family during the month. Clean hands and a pure heart

For all the Saints...

2 November All Souls' Day

For the souls in purgatory, waiting for eternal happiness and for meeting the Beloved is a source of suffering, because of the punishment due to sin which separates them from God. But there is also the certitude that once the time of purification is over, the souls will go to meet the One it desires.

Letter of Pope John Paul II for Millennium of All Souls' Day

4 November St Charles Borromeo (1538-1584), Bishop

Charles Borromeo was a leading figure of the Catholic Reformation. He was born in a castle on the shores of Lake Maggiore in northern Italy, to a powerful family. He was related to the Medici through his mother. As the second son, he was destined for a career in the Church from an early age. He received a doctorate in civil and canon law at the University of Pavia, and when his uncle was elected Pope Pius IV in 1559 he was summoned to Rome and made a cardinal. Among

many other responsibilities he was made administrator of the vacant diocese of Milan and protector of the Catholic cantons of Switzerland and of the Franciscans and the Carmelites. He played a large part in the diplomatic efforts that led to the re-opening in 1562 of the reforming Council of Trent, which had been suspended since 1552. As long as the Church was in a weak and corrupt state, emperors and kings could control it and its assets – and they would not easily give up control.



In late 1562 Charles's elder brother died, leaving him as head of the family. His relations wanted him to abandon his ecclesiastical career and marry, and even the Pope suggested it; but Charles saw his brother's death as a sign of the vanity of human wishes. Eventually, in 1563, he settled the argument by secretly being ordained priest. He was soon consecrated as Archbishop of Milan, but the Pope would not let him leave Rome because he was needed there. He worked on the catechism, the Missal and the Breviary, and reformed his own diocese as well as he could from a distance through trusted deputies.

At length Pius IV died and in 1566 his successor permitted Charles to take up residence in his diocese. He began reform from the top, giving much of his property to the poor. He set up the

Confraternity of Christian Doctrine to teach children the faith: it was the beginning and inspiration of the Sunday School movement. When famine struck the province, he fed 3,000 people at his own expense for three months and inspired others to do likewise. When plague came, he prepared himself for death, made his will, and went to the hospital where the worst cases were. After enormous amounts of nagging, preaching and persuasion the secular clergy at length followed his example.

As might be expected, Charles encountered determined opposition to his programme of reform. His aunts, in Dominican convents, treated the introduction of grilles as a personal insult. More seriously, the canons of one church slammed the door in his face to prevent him making a visitation and their servants fired at him, damaging the crucifix he was carrying; and the members of a rich and corrupt order of monks were so opposed to being reformed that one of them dressed as a layman, joined Charles's household at evening prayer, and shot him. The assassin's bullet did not penetrate Charles's clothing. (Two years later the Pope had to suppress the order and distribute its assets: a sad end to an order that had done much good and produced many saints in its 350-year history).

The King of Spain, whose jurisdiction included Milan at the time, resisted any diminution of his power, and the next fifteen years are a complex tapestry of arrests, excommunications, denunciations, calumnies, and absolutions – ending at last in peace.

Charles's final visitation was of the cantons of Switzerland in 1583, where as well as the usual corruptions and abuses he had to deal with senior priests who were practising witchcraft and sorcery, and enemies who claimed that his fight against heresy was a plot to extend Spanish domination into the region. Charles died on 3 November 1584 at the age of 46.
