I am the gate of the sheepfold

The presentation of the Good Shepherd is the nearest approach to a parable given to us in the Gospel of John. Jesus tells it immediately after a major clash with Pharisees as a result of his cure of the Man Born Blind. This position gives it additional force: the hearers could not fail to understand it in the light of the chapter of Ezekiel 34, in which the prophet contrasts the lazy and

self-seeking shepherds ruling Israel in Ezekiel's day with the ideal shepherd whom God would send as his representative. This shepherd would be God himself and his servant David. So Jesus' description of himself as the Good Shepherd is at once a claim to be the Messiah of the line of David and in some sense to be himself the divine Shepherd of Israel. Stories and images of farming life abound in all the gospels, a testimony to the background of Jesus and his hearers in the farming communities of Galilee. These were the images which would naturally spring to mind. In most of these parables sheep appear as helpless and gormless creatures, prone to getting lost and needing to be sought out, carried back on the shoulders of the shepherd – an apt image of most of us most of the time! Only in this parable are they more responsive and seem to have a real relationship with their shepherd, having the confidence to go out through the gate into freedom when he opens it, recognising his voice, following him and even responding when he calls their name. We might pray to have that confidence and warmth of relationship. We hear one of the great 'I am' statements of Jesus today 'I am the gate of the sheepfold'. Through Jesus we enter into life and safety, and we 'go through Jesus, the gate' by baptism. This image is implied in all today's readings: the people listening to Peter find this gateway and enter through it: Peter writes to remind us that we have come back to the Good Shepherd, who heals us by his wounds. This Sunday is traditionally called '**Good Shepherd Sunday**', because of the Gospel references to Jesus as the Good Shepherd. It is also the day of prayer for Vocations to the Priesthood.

Reflecting this weekend on what it means to be 'called', I am reminded of the words of **St John Henry Newman** when he wrote *Some Definite Service*. His words speak for themselves. Lord may we all come to understand you will for our lives and be generous in our response.

Some Definite Service

God knows me and calls me by my name...

God has created me to do Him some definite service;

He has committed some work to me

which He has not committed to another.

I have my mission – I never may know it in this life,

but I shall be told it in the next.

Somehow I am necessary for His purposes...

I have a part in this great work;

I am a link in a chain, a bond of connection

between persons.

He has not created me for naught. I shall do good,

I shall do His work;

I shall be an angel of peace, a preacher of truth

in my own place, while not intending it,

if I do but keep His commandments

and serve Him in my calling.

Therefore I will trust Him.

Whatever, wherever I am,

I can never be thrown away.

If I am in sickness, my sickness may serve Him;

In perplexity, my perplexity may serve Him;

If I am in sorrow, my sorrow may serve Him.

My sickness, or perplexity, or sorrow may be

necessary causes of some great end,

which is quite beyond us.

He does nothing in vain; He may prolong my life,

He may shorten it;

He knows what He is about.

He may take away my friends,

He may throw me among strangers,

He may make me feel desolate,

make my spirits sink, hide the future from me –

still He knows what He is about...

Let me be Thy blind instrument. I ask not to see –

I ask not to know – I ask simply to be used.

World Day of Prayer for Vocations

The World Day of Prayer for Vocations - also known as Vocations Sunday - this year will be celebrated on 3 May. This day flows from the broader culture of vocation, and is when the universal Church asks the Lord to send more labourers to the harvest.

The Holy Father, Pope Francis, writes:

Dear friends, on this day in particular, but also in the ordinary pastoral life of our communities, I ask the Church to continue to promote vocations. May she touch the hearts of the faithful and enable each of them to discover with gratitude God's call in their lives, to find courage to say "yes" to God, to overcome

all weariness through faith in Christ, and to make of their lives a song of praise for God, for their brothers and sisters, and for the whole world. May the Virgin Mary accompany us and intercede for us. Through your prayers and encouragement our seminarians, Albert and Andrew, continue to thrive on their vocational pathway towards ordination as Diocesan priests. If you have been watching the daily Masses streamed on location at our Cathedral, you might be aware that Albert is currently assisting Bishop Mark there, and similarly Andrew has been assisting Fr Chris Findlay-Wilson with the on-line liturgy at Parkstone, Poole. Because of the pandemic, both men have had to move away from their usual community life at seminary, and are studying remotely via on-line resources to continue their formation. Their willingness to 'up-sticks' is testimony to their fortitude and generosity of spirit under what are difficult circumstances for us all. We look forward to Albert's ordination to the Diaconate in July of this year, and to Andrew's next year.

This year we have one of our enquirers going forward to our annual selection conference to be held later this month. Do please keep Charles in your prayers as he continues to discern his way forward, seeking to carry out the Lord's will by offering his life in service of the Lord and His Church. In the meantime I'll leave you with a prayer for Vocations Sunday, which we can all make our own:

Loving Father, you call us by name.

As we journey through life help us to be confident in our own unique identity and to find opportunities to develop our own gifts and passions.

We pray that the Holy Spirit will pour on us wisdom and guidance to help us realise and follow our dreams, discerning your plan for our lives.

Bless your Church by raising up dedicated and generous people from our families and friends who will serve as Priests, Deacons, Sisters and Brothers.

May we support one another in response to God's call.

We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Migrants' Mass 2020

Tuesday 28 April at 11.27am. Each year, near to the Feast of St Joseph the Worker, the migrant communities of Brentwood, Southwark and Westminster gathers for a Mass that is full of song, vibrant energy and great joy. This year, as we can't gather in church, we will be celebrating the Migrants' Mass using [Instagram Live](#) and [YouTube](#) on Saturday 2 May, at 10.30am The theme for 2020 is: 'You are clapping for us, now pray with us' We value the incredible contribution of migrants to so many services that are now being recognised and honoured as essential. Many Migrant workers are amongst those on the 'frontline' – in the NHS and care homes; working as delivery drivers, cleaners and caterers. This is a moment to honour them in prayer – especially considering so many are financially vulnerable, working on zero-hours contracts or pay that is below the Real Living Wage. We also remember the wonderful Catholic Social Teaching that recognises everyone as "our brothers and sisters", calls us to tear down borders that divide and exclude any group of people, and has mandated us to pay a Real Living Wage ever since Pope Leo XIII wrote about it in 1891. The Mass can only be online, of course, as we cannot gather together physically. We also appreciate that not every family can access the Internet as they have no Wi-Fi or hardware. Feast of St Richard Reynolds

May 5 is the day that we remember St Richard Reynolds. He is thought to have come from Pinhoe and was a Brigettine monk of Syon Abbey on the Thames. He suffered martyrdom with the Carthusians at Tyburn on 4 May 1535, for refusing to take the oath of royal supremacy under Henry VIII. He was known for his personal holiness, and was one of the forty martyrs canonised by Pope Paul VI in 1970. Syon Abbey, one of the great medieval monasteries, was dissolved in 1539 by Henry. The expelled community moved from place to place in France and Spain, finally settling in Lisbon in 1594. This same community moved from Lisbon back to England in 1861, settling in Spetisbury, Dorset then in Chudleigh and finally in 1925 in South Brent. The community remained here until the closure of Syon Abbey in 2011. Some artefacts, including the pillar from the original Syon Abbey, were presented to the Blessed Sacrament being the closest to St Richard Reynolds' birthplace. The pillar can be found in the martyrs chapel at the rear of the church. Our parish centre is named in his honour.

The Word

SUNDAY 3 MAY *Fourth Sunday of Easter*

FIRST READING

Acts 2:14.36-41

God has made him both Lord and Christ.

On the day of Pentecost Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd in a loud voice: 'The whole House of Israel can be certain that God has made this Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ.' Hearing this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and the apostles, 'What must we do, brothers?' 'You must repent,' Peter answered 'and every one of you must be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise that was made is for you and your children, and for all those who are far away, for all those whom the Lord our God will call to himself.' He spoke to them for a long time using many arguments, and he urged them, 'Save yourselves from this perverse generation.' They were convinced by his arguments, and they accepted what he said and were baptised. That very day about three thousand were added to their number.

The merit, in the sight of God, is in bearing punishment patiently when you are punished after doing your duty. This, in fact, is what you were called to do, because Christ suffered for you and left an example for you to follow the way he took. He had not done anything wrong, and there had been no perjury in his mouth. He was insulted and did not retaliate with insults; when he was tortured he made no threats but he put his trust in the righteous judge. He was bearing our faults in his own body on the cross, so that we might die to our faults and live for holiness; through his wounds you have been healed. You had gone astray like sheep but now you have come back to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

GOSPEL

John 10:1-10

I am the gate of the sheepfold

Jesus said: 'I tell you most solemnly, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate, but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. The one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the flock; the gatekeeper lets him in, the sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out. When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice. They never follow a stranger but run away from him: they do not recognise the voice of strangers.'

Jesus told them this parable but they failed to understand what he meant by telling it to them. So Jesus spoke to them again:

'I tell you most solemnly, I am the gate of the sheepfold.

All others who have come are thieves and brigands; but the sheep took no notice of them. I am the gate.

Anyone who enters through me will be safe:

he will go freely in and out and be sure of finding pasture.

The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy.

I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full.'
