Advent opens with a great cry, and a great promise: 'Oh that you would tear the heavens open and come down!' is the cry, of a people who need God. '...The master is coming' is the promise, not to breed fear, but to answer our cry. Advent begins, not with thoughts of the past, with the coming of the Lord we celebrate at Christmas, but with the future, and the promise that He is coming back. We are encouraged to treat every day as the day the Lord will come; we do not do this out of fear for a Master who beats his servants, but out of love of a Master who always treats us with love and mercy. Nevertheless we must always be watchful, because we can grow sleepy and complacent, saying that we can leave this prayer or that confession or the other change in the way we live to tomorrow. Even as we look forward to the tomorrow of the Lord's coming, we must remember that it might be today!

First Sunday of Advent



I don't know about you but I seem to feel tired all the time at the moment. Staying awake is not the easiest thing. So the injunction in today's Gospel (which is repeated 4 times!) makes me feel even more tired! Today a new year begins in the Church. The readings of the last few weeks have been about the end times and the vision of St John in the book of the Apocalypse. Now, as we enter the season of Advent we look forward to the coming of Christ in all his glory. We want to be

ready for that day. We don't want to be caught spiritually slumbering, like the unwise virgins who had no oil for their lamps. So the Church offers us these weeks of preparation, inviting us to reflect more deeply on the meaning of the kingdom and the invitation we have been given to take our place in it. It is only half way through Advent that our thoughts turn to the first coming of Jesus, the celebration of his nativity.

We hear commentators in the media asking the question "Will Christmas be cancelled this year?". The answer of course is NO. How could we cancel the commemoration of the birth of our Saviour? What will be different is how we celebrate. We will need to be (and indeed are already being) creative about how we join together to give thanks and make the coming weeks and days truly meaningful. This morning I attended a 'virtual' Christ the King liturgy at St Nicholas School. It was different, each class watching the film on the screen, but it was no less powerful for that. I hope and pray that in the coming weeks we will be able to enter the true spirit of the season and take time to prepare ourselves for the coming feast. I assure you, as always, of my prayers for you and the whole parish community. God bless you all. And make sure you get some sleep! *Fr Jonathan*

Message from Bishop Mark about celebrations at Christmas

We all recognise that Christmas is an important time for all the faithful to attend Mass. COVID-19 restrictions will continue to limit the number of people at liturgical celebrations for safety reasons, even after the 2 December. At our Bishops' Conference meeting this week we agreed that since the Solemnity of Christmas has an Octave, we would take a joint approach in **encouraging the faithful to attend Holy Mass on any day during the Octave**, to enter into the mystery of the Incarnation. It will also be important to encourage people to 'mark' the preparation for Christmas as well as the celebration of Christmas and the Octave, *domestically* in their homes. This will assist them in marking this important solemnity, as well as coming to Church for Mass, if possible, at some point in the Octave.

Monday 28 No Mass

Tuesday 29 St Thomas Becket 6.30pm

Wednesday 30 9.30am

Places at Masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day will be allotted strictly by first come first served. Please be generous and remember that space is limited.

Mass streamed live

The live streaming equipment is being fitted at the moment so you will be able to access all Christmas Masses online. We are delighted that we will be able to do this as we know many of you are still anxious about coming to church which is completely understandable.

Stewarding at Christmas

We will be in Tier 2 after the end of lockdown. This means Mass can be celebrated with a congregation but we will still be subject to social distancing regulations. This means the capacity of the church remains the same as when we were open in the summer. To enable us to celebrate Mass publicly we need 3 stewards at each Mass, including those at Christmas. Bishops welcome a return to public worship

Wednesday, November 25th, 2020 @ 12:34 pm

The government has confirmed that collective worship can resume in churches and other places of worship when the national lockdown expires on 2 December. This decision applies across all three tiers of COVID-19 restrictions in England. On behalf of the Bishops, the General Secretary of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, Canon Christopher Thomas, commented: "The Catholic Community in England is delighted at the Government's decision to allow the resumption of collective worship following the national lockdown in all three tiers. "This decision reflects the importance of the right of all people to express their faith in worship, but more importantly, it is an acknowledgement of the active collaboration the church has had with public officials in developing COVID-secure protocols in our churches. "As we move forward, it is incumbent on all who come to worship God in our churches to play their part in keeping themselves and others safe by following all of the guidance that has been prepared. "Through our encounter with Christ in the Eucharist and other sacraments celebrated in the Church, the works of charity which have been expressed through Catholic charities and communities over the last nine months finds its source and goal."

Christmas Greetings

This year we are asking you to take a picture of either your family, your crib, your tree, your lights, or anything to do with the Christmas season and add your family name. These will be put together as a slide show and be projected on the screen at all of the Christmas Masses so that your greetings will go to all parishioners. Please do not bring Christmas cards and leave them in the church as they will be removed and thrown away.

Times for Individual Prayer

While we were unable to open the church for collective worship we opened for times of private prayer. These have been lovely and appreciated by the many who have come along. Now that we will be able to open for the celebration of Mass we will no longer be opening for private prayer. As the church opens twenty minutes before Mass starts this time could be spent in the church in a time of prayer and contemplation.

Catholic Women's League – alive and kicking!

During these long eight months, the Catholic Women's League in the three Exeter parishes has not been idle. Although not able to meet, contact has been maintained within the Exeter Section, and also by frequent letters containing information and encouragement sent from the National Office, all maintaining the purposes of the League - of Charity, Work and Loyalty. Support for our parishes has continued throughout the past year, and by making the most of the first few free months, monies in excess of £2000 has been raised and divided among seven charities, local and international. These are St Petroc's, Julian House, FORCE, Exeter Leukaemia Fund and Exeter Community Initiative - all local: while help to The Sisters of the Presentation of Mary's Children's Home in the Philippines, and Mary's Meals provide essential help far away. Help in kind has also been given to the Apostleship of the Sea. The League, active for well over 100 years, remains loyal to its principles here in Exeter, while its members enjoy its association with their parishes and with each other.

Sleep on the floor for a night



It's hard to believe that in this day and age, there are children who do not have a warm and comfy bed to sleep in at night. In fact one in five children living in the southwest are living in poverty. Some areas in our Diocese fall into the top 10% of the most deprived areas in England. As part of our Good Shepherd programme, this Christmas the **Catholic Children's Society**

(Plymouth) is asking children living in our Diocese to think of children less fortunate than themselves by putting themselves in their shoes just for one night.

We are asking children living in the diocese to give up their bed for one night to sleep on the floor. If 100 children could raise £10 each in sponsorship, CCSP could buy beds and mattresses for 10 children, so they never have to sleep on the floor again. Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales

Statement on Safeguarding Friday 20 November 2020

The account given in the IICSA Report of abuse known to be inflicted on children in the Catholic Church in England and Wales in the past 50 years is shocking and overwhelming. At our meeting this week, we Bishops have stood together in profound shame. We express our sorrow and contrition before God. We have reflected on our need to reach out afresh to those who bear the wounds of permanent damage caused by this abuse. We commit ourselves to listen more intently to those who have been abused so as to learn from them and benefit from their wisdom. It is through learning from their testimony that hearts are changed.

We are grateful to those survivors who have come forward, not only to lay before us their experience of abuse, but to help us understand the depth of their pain. We invite anyone who has experienced abuse to come forward, no matter how long ago the abuse took place. We undertake to listen carefully to them with open heart and mind and support them on a journey of healing. We have carefully considered the recommendations of the IICSA Report and formally accepted them. We have already begun work towards their implementation.

The IICSA's generic hearings into the Church began last October. Around that time we commissioned an Independent Review of our Safeguarding Structures and Arrangements in the Catholic Church in England and Wales. This was carried out by Mr Ian Elliott, an experienced safeguarding professional who has worked across the world in this area.

This week, alongside the IICSA Report, we have also examined in depth the Final Report of the Elliott Review and fully accepted its recommendations. It is a searching analysis of our safeguarding work, in its weaknesses and strengths. It proposes a number of remedial and forward-looking recommendations, which accord with the IICSA Report's own recommendations. The work of implementation will begin immediately. It will be carried out in close cooperation with the Religious Orders who play such an important part in the life of the Church.

In all our activities, our desire and resolve is to be a Church in which every child and vulnerable person is not only safe but nurtured into human flourishing. These recommendations present us with steps towards this goal. Key to them is a standards-based approach to safeguarding together with a specially commissioned national body with powers of effective audit and oversight of safeguarding in both Dioceses and Religious Orders. Everyone in the Church will be required to work to clear, published standards of behaviour and action. Most significantly, the Elliott Report has been fashioned with the participation of survivors of abuse. Their insight and wisdom has been crucial. We thank them for their great courage and generosity in working with us and we look forward to continuing this growing collaboration.

The Elliott Report builds on all that has been achieved in our safeguarding ministry in the past 20 years, achievements also recognised in the IICSA Report. Therefore we thank profoundly all who contribute to the work of safeguarding in the Church today: the thousands of Parish Safeguarding Representatives, the professionals who work in our Safeguarding Offices in every Diocese, the Safeguarding Commissions who oversee this work and give objective and professional advice to guide our decisions, the staff of the Catholic Safeguarding Advisory Service and those who serve on the National Catholic Safeguarding Commission. These, and many others, have contributed greatly to the current work of safeguarding in the Church. Today, however, we acknowledge without hesitation, our failings, our mistakes, our lack of adequate cooperation. We express our deep sorrow and ask forgiveness, especially from victims and survivors. We affirm our resolve to effect the next step in our work of safeguarding and care for survivors. In prayer we turn to Christ the Good Shepherd, the fount of healing and compassion, asking that this moment of painful truth becomes a time of grace as we strive to fulfil the ministry entrusted to us as bishops in an unshakeable unity of purpose.

We are very excited to announce that we are going to have a pop-up Giving Hub in Roman Walk, Princesshay from 19 November to the end of December. The shop unit will provide a space for a host of different things to happen, these will include:

- A place to donate items such as coats, sleeping bags, hats and gloves (we will be working with St Petrock's to create a regular wish list);
- An alternative giving hub – a unit in the window so people can donate 24/7 and a mobile giving unit in the shop if people want to come in for a chat when they donate;
- A TV screen will show videos, images, ways to get involved and will also show a montage of videos from a wide range of people from across the city answering the question “What does home mean to you?”
- An interactive plinth will provide people with the opportunity to learn more about EHP and to complete a questionnaire (with prizes) that will help us gather a wide understanding of people's current knowledge of homelessness, this will play an important role in helping us decide on next steps for EHP during the coming year;
- Individuals, organisations, businesses will also be encouraged to sign up to the EHP charter and join the citywide conversation to end homelessness in Exeter.

We plan to open the Hub from 10.00am-4.00pm Thursday, Friday and Saturday. It's no mean feat to staff the hub for that amount of time and we would really like to hear from anyone who is able to volunteer their time to help us. Of course we will be following all COVID guidelines, and provide PPE and training. If you are interested and able to donate your time (whole day 10am-4pm; or half day 10-1pm, or 1pm-4pm) then please get in touch.


