23 May 2021. Pentecost Sunday. Year B



The Spirit of truth will lead you to the complete truth

This Sunday we arrive at the fiftieth day - the completion of the Easter Season, and the completion of the Paschal Mystery: the Lord has died, is risen, has ascended to heaven and now gives birth to his Church, by sending the Spirit upon the apostles. This feast of the gift of the Spirit is so significant for us, because it marks the handing on of Jesus' ministry to the Church - in the Church we are guaranteed the presence of the Lord, in his sacraments, in his ministers, in the Blessed Sacrament and in his celebrated word. It also marks the fulfilment of our thoughts about baptism

throughout this season: the gift of the Spirit which we receive in Confirmation is the `seal' of our baptism, guaranteeing and confirming all that baptism achieves. The Holy Spirit gives us the courage to fulfil our baptismal calling to bring Jesus Christ's message of hope to the world.

Pentecost

The name "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word meaning "fiftieth." Like Easter, it is tied to a Jewish feast. 49 days (7 weeks, or "a week of weeks") after the second day of Passover, the Jews celebrated the Feast of Weeks (Shavuot). Passover celebrates the freeing of the Jews from slavery; Shavuot celebrates their becoming God's holy people by the gift and acceptance of the Law; and the counting of the days to Shavuot symbolises their yearning for the Law. From a strictly practical point of view, Shavuot was a very good time for the Holy Spirit to come down and inspire the Apostles to preach to all nations because, being a pilgrimage festival, it was an occasion when Jerusalem was filled with pilgrims from many countries. Symbolically, the parallel with the Jews is exact. We are freed from the slavery of death and sin by Easter; with the Apostles, we spend some time as toddlers under the tutelage of the risen Jesus; and when he has left, the Spirit comes down on us and we become a Church.

Pastoral Letter for Pentecost

In Bishop Mark's letter for this Sunday he highlights the importance of the environment and our call to care for our common home. "In a few weeks time the G7 meeting of world leaders will take place at Carbis Bay in Cornwall. One of the key themes of that gathering is the environment. This Pentecost Sunday we do well to remember God's creation at this challenging time and to pray with the psalmist: 'Send forth your Spirit, O Lord and renew the face of the earth.'"

A Parish Pentecost

St John Henry Newman said "To grow is to change and to be perfect is to have changed often". Change is a natural part of life, we see it in the dying and rising of nature, the newness of spring overcoming the seeming dead of winter. To change is to be renewed. The early Church was transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit into a community which left its safety and security and went out as missionary disciples to the world, preaching God's message of hope and life. We have all experienced many changes in the last year and a half, our lives have been turned upside down by the pandemic. For some life will never be the same. So this is a perfect opportunity for us as a community to examine the way want to be renewed. In the next few weeks and months we will be engaging in a process of renewal, examining our communal life and asking important questions about who we are and what we are called to do as disciples of the Lord. Bishop Mark's document A Precious Place of God's Grace is asking the same questions and encouraging us as a diocese to be courageous.

To begin this process I have composed a Parish Prayer of Renewal (below). Prayer is the first and most important thing we should do; turning to the Lord and asking the Holy Spirit to lead and guide us, to transform us and show us how to truly live.

I ask you to make a personal commitment to pray this as often as you can, daily, if possible. Pray it on your own and with your family, pray it with others you meet from the parish, pray it on the bus or in the bath, let's make it our prayer for our parish. And let's open ourselves to what God wants for us and let's not be surprised but rather rejoice in his power to renew us all. Fr Jonathan.

Recognising the Ministry of Catechist

We warmly welcome Pope Francis's Apostolic Letter <u>Antiquum Ministerium</u>, formally recognising the ministry of catechist and look forward to what it proposes for the Universal Church and for the Church in England and Wales. See attached letter from Bishop David Evans Chair, Committee for Catechesis. Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales

Pope Francis reminds us that we cannot "forget the countless lay men and women who directly took part in the spread of the Gospel through catechetical instruction. Men and women of deep faith, authentic witnesses of holiness, who in some cases were also founders of Churches and eventually died as martyrs. In our own day too, many competent and dedicated catechists are community leaders in various parts of the world and carry out a mission invaluable for the transmission and growth of the faith." (AM3) Through baptism all are called to a new life in Christ and share in the life of the Church. Each member of the Church is called to serve the Lord by the manner of their lives and so this new ministry is an opportunity for us to discern how the Lord wishes us to serve Him in the Church. Those called to the ministry of catechist, like all called to serve in the Church, will share in a key responsibility to proclaim the faith and form others as they come to know the Lord. The ministry of catechist, which is set in the ancient tradition of the Church, is rooted in service of the Lord and his Gospel in the life of the Church so Pope Francis reminds us that: "The role played by catechist is one specific form of service among others within the Christian community... every catechist must be a witness to the faith, a teacher, a mystagogue, a companion and pedagogue, who teaches for the Church." (AM 6) The "motu proprio" makes it clear that this new ministry of catechist is aligned to the bishop's ministry in the local Church. The diocesan bishop is to promote the discernment and formation of this new ministry so that it is set in service of the Church. Pope Francis reminds us: "It is in fact a stable form of service rendered to the local Church in accordance with the pastoral needs identified by the local Ordinary, yet one carried out as work of the laity, as demanded by the very nature of the ministry." Monday 24 May The Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church

The Blessed Virgin Mary has been given the title of Mother of the Church since she gave birth to Christ, the Head of the Church, and she became the Mother of the redeemed people before her Son had given up the spirit on the Cross. Pope Paul VI solemnly confirmed the title in an address to the Fathers of the Second


Vatican Council on 21 November 1964 and decreed that the whole Christian people should, by the use of this beautiful title, give still greater honour to the Mother of God. This celebration was instituted in 2018 and then added to the General Roman (Universal) Calendar. The decree states 'This celebration will help us to remember that growth in the Christian life must be anchored to the mystery of the Cross, to the oblation of Christ in the Eucharistic Banquet and to the Mother of the Redeemer and the Mother of the Redeemed, the Virgin who makes her offering to God'.



Tuesday 25 May St Bede the Venerable

He was born in the north of England, near the monastery of Wearmouth. He joined that monastery, and spent all his life there or at Jarrow, teaching and writing. He was the outstanding ecclesiastical author of his time. He wrote commentaries on Scripture; an ecclesiastical history of the English people, which is a unique and irreplaceable resource for much of early English history; and the first martyrology (collection of saints' lives) to be compiled on historical principles. He was also the first known writer of English prose, though this has not survived. He died at

Jarrow on 25 May 735: he taught and worked until the last moments of his life. He is venerated as the "light of the Church" in the Dark Ages, and as a forerunner of the 8th and 9th century renaissance of the Western Church.



Wednesday 26 May St Philip Neri

He was born in Florence in 1515. At the age of eighteen he went to Rome, and earned his living as a tutor. He undertook much-needed charitable work among the young men of the city, and started a brotherhood to help the sick poor and pilgrims.

He was advised that he could do more good as a priest, and was ordained in 1551. He built an oratory over the church of San Girolamo, where he invented services, consisting of spiritual readings and hymns, which were the origin of the oratorio. He continued to serve the young men of Rome, rich and poor alike, with religious discussions and by organising charitable enterprises. He had a particular care for the young students at the English College in Rome, studying for a missionary life and probable martyrdom in England. He inspired other

clergy to emulate him, and formed them into the Congregation of the Oratory. Oratorian foundations still flourish in many countries today. He died in Rome in 1595. St Philip Neri was an enemy of solemnity and conventionality. When some of his more pompous penitents made their confession to him (he was famous as a confessor) he imposed salutary and deflating penances on them, such as walking through the streets of Rome carrying his cat (he was very fond of cats). When a novice showed signs of excessive seriousness, Philip stood on his head in front of him, to make him laugh. When people looked up to him too much, he did something ridiculous so that they should not respect someone who was no wiser – and no less sinful – than they were. In every case there was an excellent point to his pranks: to combat pride, or melancholy, or hero-worship. Laughter is not much heard in churches: perhaps that is to be expected... but outside church, Christians should laugh more than anyone else – laugh from sheer joy, that God bothered to make us, and that he continues to love us despite the idiots we are. Everyone is a sinner, but Christians are sinners redeemed – an undeserved rescue that we make even less deserved by everything we do. It is too serious a matter to be serious about: all we can reasonably do is rejoice. Very many of

the saints, not just St Philip, have an abiding terror of being looked up to. For they know their imperfections better than anyone else, and being revered by other people is doubly bad. It is bad for the others, who should be revering God instead, and for themselves, because they might be tempted to believe their own image and believe themselves to be worthy. We are not saints yet, but we, too, should beware. Uprightness and virtue do have their rewards, in self-respect and in respect from others, and it is easy to find ourselves aiming for the result rather than the cause. Let us aim for joy, rather than respectability. Let us make fools of ourselves from time to time, and thus see ourselves, for a moment, as the all-wise God sees us.



Thursday 27 May Our Lord Jesus Christ the Eternal High Priest

The feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the Eternal High Priest according to the order of Melchizedek. In him the Father has been well pleased from before all time. As Mediator between God and human beings. fulfilling his Father's will, he sacrificed himself once on the altar of the Cross as a saving Victim for the whole world. Thus, instituting the pattern of an everlasting sacrifice, with a brother's kindness he chose, from among the children of Adam, men to augment the priesthood, so that, from the sacrifice continually renewed in the Church, streams of divine power might flow, whereby a new heaven and a new earth might be made, and throughout the whole universe there would be perfected what no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor has entered into the human heart.

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created and you shall renew the face of the earth.
