# They were like sheep without a shepherd

"Sheep without a shepherd."
This is the simple theme of today's readings. It is interesting that Jesus' reaction to the crowd is one of pity – as he sees their great thirst for his

teachings. This is, in a sense, a clear fulfilment of the prophecy we hear in the first reading, where God promises a true shepherd who will care for the people of Israel. Shepherding is a particularly suitable image of God's love and care. The dependency of the sheep on their shepherd, their wandering and drifting without someone to guide them, is also a suitable image of the people God loves. Our own age also displays sheep without shepherds - a great wandering crowd, seeking something, but not knowing what they are seeking. It is to this flock that the present day followers of Jesus are sent as shepherds.

#### Emerging from restrictions

The current restrictions will change on July 18. We hope that coming to church will feel much more like it used to. At the moment church is a very safe place and we intend to keep it that way! We are distanced and masked and it is cleaned after each Mass. The track and trace requirements will remain for some time, we just have to be patient.

The new guidance from the Bishops' Conference for Step 4 of the government's roadmap has been published. We will consider the implications for our parish this week and then publish our own guidelines next week as we are being asked to take the local situation into consideration.

We have been subject to legal restrictions for some time; we are now being asked to take personal responsibility for our own safety and the safety of others, particularly the most vulnerable. The prime minister has said that "We cannot simply revert instantly from Monday 19 July to life as it was before Covid. It requires constant vigilance, it means thinking about others as well as yourself."

For churches this will mean that with the removal of legal restrictions comes a fresh set of decisions about what 'responsible' actions should now be taken. Whilst we rejoice in enabling more people to attend church, we will continue to sanitise our hands, wear masks and be sensible about distancing ourselves from others.

We are moving from a regime of 'must' to one of 'you ought to', or 'we strongly advise you', which poses its own challenges to local churches and congregations, where policy will continue to be based upon risk assessments for public worship, home groups, singing and so forth. Churches should "...use these freedoms responsibly... with infections rising, it is clear that risks remain, so a cautious approach is called for.

As we emerge from the pandemic, let's make grace our primary value. We need to show compassion and understanding as people wrestle through the implications and come to differing conclusions. Let's celebrate that we can worship together more freely, but also continue to love and care for our neighbour."

We all must exercise personal responsibility and carefully manage the risks from Covid-19. As Christians, called to love our neighbour as ourselves, we must also exercise collective responsibility and continue to take appropriate precautions to protect others.


#### Loneliness Pen Pal Project

#### Annual Appeal 2021 – 'Step Forward, Reach Out and Help'

#### FOR ALL THE SAINTS...

#### 22 July St Mary Magdalene



Mary of Magdala was healed of "seven devils" by Jesus. She ministered to him in Galilee and was present at his crucifixion. She was in the group of women who were the first to discover the empty tomb, and it was to her that the risen Jesus first appeared.

The Western tradition is that Mary Magdalene is also "the woman who was a sinner" and the sister of Martha and Lazarus of Bethany. There is no evidence either way, and the tradition is tenuous enough for even such authorities as St Ambrose to hold, with the East, that they are three different people. It seems, therefore, that

although the Western tradition is to be respected and is a real inspiration, it may not necessarily be historical. (Indeed, in 2021 Mary of Bethany was formally recognised as separate, being included in the same feast as Martha and Lazarus, a week after Mary of Magdala).

This kind of ambiguity is inevitable in a religion such as Christianity, which is founded on definite historical events rather than myths which can be adjusted into logicality. We need not worry about it too much: if it had been harmful to us to celebrate the tradition of heroic penitence, the Holy Spirit would not have allowed it. Even without the extra tradition, Mary Magdalene is a unique and important character in the story of the Resurrection, chosen by Christ as one of the first witnesses of the event that changed the world.

#### 23 July St Bridget of Sweden (1303 – 1373) Religious, Patron of Europe



She was married to a nobleman and had eight children. At the age of 30 she was summoned to the court of the King of Sweden, where she served as lady-in-waiting to the queen. She tried without much success to moderate the riotous and indecent life of the royal court. After a pilgrimage to the shrine of St James at Compostela in Spain, Bridget and her husband Ulf decided to spend the rest of their lives in monasteries. Ulf died in 1344, but Bridget went on to found a double monastery (for men and women in separate but adjacent institutions) as the start of a new monastic order.

In 1350 she travelled to Rome for the Holy Year, and spent the rest of her life there caring for the poor and the sick, denouncing the excesses of the aristocracy, and robustly telling the Pope to return to Rome from Avignon.

She had many mystical visions, which alarmed

her because she feared that they might be the work of the Devil; but a learned Cistercian monk reassured her, and she subsequently dictated and published the revelations she received, which were partially devotional and partly prophetic.
