

Just as the prophets Elijah and Elisha, Jesus is not sent to the Jews only

Last week, when Jesus spoke in the synagogue, his words pleased the crowd - as we hear at the beginning of today's Gospel. How quickly the mood changes! This story shows very clearly that Jesus was not a "crowd-pleaser" – he wasn't interested in saying the right things to be popular or accepted. He was interested in the truth - which is the basic definition of a prophet – whatever the personal cost. So today, when Jesus points out that salvation is not just for the Jews, or even just the people of Nazareth, they reject the message and the messenger. Just like Jeremiah, when he was called to be a prophet (first reading), Jesus has to confront the land: they will fight with him, but not overcome him.

Covid-19 Updated Guidance for Churches

From Canon Chris Thomas, the General Secretary of the Bishops Conference, following consultation and advice from Public Health England. In regard to the celebration of Mass, you will see:

- There should be a return to the normal mode of celebrating Mass respecting the integrity of the Rite.
- This includes the reintroduction of the Prayer of the Faithful
- The Sign of Peace may be offered again if felt appropriate,
- Holy Communion should be distributed at the usual place and no longer at the end of the celebration (as people leave the Church).
- Holy Communion can be distributed in the normal manner with the faithful approaching the minister in an orderly procession.
- For the time being, Holy Communion is to be given under one kind only (the Sacred Host).

Alongside the positive effects of Covid vaccination, it should be stressed that any people displaying symptoms of Covid-19 should stay at home and not participate in acts of worship in church. This is good practice for any transmissible illness.

Churches should continue to ensure there is good ventilation, balancing this against the need for church heating, especially at this time.

Whilst it is still good practice to sanitise hands on entry and exit of churches, there is no need for readers to sanitise their hands before reading.

All ministers of Holy Communion (clergy and lay people) should still sanitise their hands for the distribution of Holy Communion.

Holy water stoups may be refilled but care should be seen that the water is changed regularly (at a minimum of once a week).

Usual forms of church cleaning are sufficient.

Whilst this reduction of restrictions brings about a more normal way of living, the Covid-19 virus is still in circulation, and this should be in the mind of those participating in the life of the Church as time goes forward holding in balance the need for personal safety and taking responsibility for that safety.

Return to Ministry

Stewards: With the return to more normality in the church Stewards will still welcome and assist people as they come to Mass. Some people may still wish to retain distance from themselves to others.

Readers: There has already been a rota put in place for those who wish to read at Sunday Masses but there are people who may like to read at weekday Masses. If that is you, please make yourself known to Fr Jonathan or Fr John when you arrive and offer to read.

Offertory Procession: We can now reinstate the offertory procession. We are asking the Stewards to invite someone as they arrive at Mass to process the gifts up to the altar.

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion: With more people returning to Masses there is a need for ministers to assist in the distribution of Holy Communion. If this is something that you would be prepared to do please let Fr Jonathan or Fr John know when you arrive at Mass. We will not be issuing a rota at this point in time.

Receiving Holy Communion: The distribution of Holy Communion is at the usual time during Mass. Stewards will invite you to go forward to receive from the front of the church. You should return to your seat by the side aisle. Those in seats at the side should wait until those in the main body of the church have been to communion and go forward from the back of the church.

Collection: We will not be resuming passing a collection basket around the church for the time being but stewards will be at the doors, as you leave, to accept any offering that you wish to make. Thank you for your continued generosity.

Heatree Residential



Music Session at St David's Church



SAINTS OF THE WEEK...

31 January St John Bosco Priest (1815 - 1888)



Born in Piedmont of a peasant family, he was brought up by his widowed mother. He became a priest, and his particular concern was for the young. He settled in Turin, where, the industrial revolution was bringing enormous movements of population and consequent social problems, especially for the young men who came there to work. John Bosco devoted himself to the care of the young, first of all by means of evening classes, and then by setting up a boarding-house for apprentices, and then workshops for their training and education.

Despite many difficulties, caused both by the anti-clerical civil authorities and by the opposition of some senior people within the Church, his enterprise grew, and by 1868 over 800 boys and young men were under his care. To ensure the continuation of his work, he founded a congregation, named after St Francis de Sales and today the Salesians continue his work all over the world.



5 February St Agatha

She was martyred at Catania in Sicily, probably during the persecution of Decius (250-253). Devotion to her was widespread in the Church in the earliest times and she is mentioned in the Roman Canon of the Mass.


